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





Placing Age Groups in Political Space

- Two dominant dimensions of political ideology
 - Economic left-right
 - Cultural left-right
- Economic Left-right: Agreement with the statement "The government should take measures to reduce differences in income levels."
- Cultural left-right: agreement with the statement "Gay men and lesbians should be free to live their own life as they wish."


